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### **Meeting Opening**

Mr. Lewis called the meeting to order and everyone in attendance recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

### **Approval of Agenda**

Ms. Smith then made a motion to approve the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

### **Approval of Minutes**

Ms. Clarity made a motion to approve the minutes from the June 20, 2024 Regular Meeting with correcting the date error. Motion carried unanimously.

### **Public Comments**

Ms. LaVere read public comments submitted through the online portal. There were no public comments from the audience in attendance.

### **Director's Report**

Updated voter registration statistics were included in an addendum to the agenda packet.

Ms. LaVere provided the following updates:

- The State Board met today and heard our request to change the early voting plan to use the Moose Lodge for early voting; the State Board approved the change. We will work to get the approved schedule published.

### **Old Business**

#### **Public Comment Policy**

Ms. LaVere clarified that the proposed policy would not exclude comments from the portal; it would provide an administrative cut-off at the day before the meeting and those comments would then be added to the public agenda packet.

Live-streaming of meetings was added during the pandemic to provide an additional means of access to meetings, it is not required to be live-streamed or recorded. It has not been a standard practice to post recordings of meetings. The recording is currently used as an administrative item for reference in formalizing minutes. The goal of adopting a policy is to have consistency and uniformity when hearing public comments.

The board discussed the proposed public comment policy.

Ms. Clarity suggested that emails to board members be handled in the same manner as comments submitted through the portal, and that an individual be limited to one platform to make public comments (they could not submit online and make in-person comments).

Mr. Clarity suggested adding a bullet point that board members would have discretion in engaging with questions during the public comment period.

Mr. Smith and Mr. Randall commented they wanted to make sure if there are groups that they are encouraged to use a spokesperson.

Ms. LaVere provided information on the policy that is used by County Commissioners during their meetings; "Each speaker will have a maximum of three minutes to speak. A speaker may not sign up to speak more than once during the same public comment period. No time may be yielded to a speaker by another speaker. To avoid repetitiveness, groups are encouraged to select a spokesperson to speak on their behalf. At the request of the Board, groups of persons supporting or opposing the same positions may be asked to designate a spokesperson to speak, and the designated spokesperson may be allotted up to 8 minutes. Additional time may be allowed at the discretion of the Board"

Mr. Randall suggested the same policy the Commissioners use be included, replacing bullet point 4 in the draft, to allow consistency and continuity.

Mr. Randall made a motion to approve the public comment policy with the changes as discussed. Motion carried unanimously.

## **New Business**

### **Polling Place Changes**

Staff has evaluated polling places following the primary and in consideration of growth in the county, is recommending the following changes to polling places ahead of the November 5, 2024 general election:

Ms. LaVere reviewed precincts as summarized in the executive summary (attached).

Ms. Clarity made a motion to approve polling place changes as recommended by staff and summarized in the executive summary. Motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Pelton commended the staff on tremendous effort to research polling places and make changes to improve efficiencies at polling locations.

Mr. Randall made a motion to adjourn. The motion carried unanimously.

# Executive Summary: Polling Place Relocations and Preparations to Reduce Wait Times for the General Election

FOR CONSIDERATION JULY 16, 2024

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## Estimating Voter Wait Times

Staff has worked to predict turnout and wait times for election day in the general election. Turnout in each precinct was estimated based on past presidential election data. These estimates served as the basis for entering data into a [line optimization tool](#) from [MIT's Voting Technology Project Toolkit](#). The tool, which uses simple queueing theory and research data on polling places and elections, generates average, maximum, and minimum wait times throughout the day once the data is entered.

Using this tool, we adjusted the number of pollbooks, voting booths, and ballot scanners to create scenarios where the maximum estimated wait time is 23 minutes, measured from the moment a voter gets in line to when they insert their ballot into a scanner.

## Polling Place Relocations

A thorough evaluation of precinct boundaries was completed in 2021 and several polling places were relocated, precinct lines redrawn, and new precincts created. Brunswick County continues to grow rapidly, and the changes that are currently being recommended are necessary to ensure voters of Brunswick County have access to polling places of the appropriate size and functionality.

When assessing polling places and precinct boundaries, we must consider the following:

- Census blocks – Precinct lines must coincide with census block boundaries (GS 163-132.3)
  - Because census blocks are only updated once every 10 years, using them to alter precinct lines is challenging given the continuous growth of Brunswick County.
- Public recognition of polling place's facility and location
- Availability of polling places
- Functionality of polling place
  - Parking, including curbside voting availability
  - ADA compliance
  - Voting enclosure's location within the building
  - Size of voting enclosure for number of voters, equipment, supplies, and poll workers
  - Area outside enclosure to allow space to queue voters in line
  - Physical condition of facility including factors such as electrical access, climate control, restrooms, break room access for poll workers
  - Other designated use of facility during the election period

On June 14, 2024, we issued a [news release](#) asking the community for assistance finding suitable polling locations. Our hope is to begin identifying all potential facilities in the county to facilitate the continued growth in the county.



## Precinct CB02 Shallotte – change in polling location

The Brunswick Center at Shallotte is not ideal for voting due to limited parking and open space, making it hard to define the voting area. We recommend relocating to West Brunswick High School, 550 Whiteville Rd NW, Shallotte, NC 28470.


We previously used West Brunswick High School as a polling place in 2020 and 2021. In 2021, school was in session on election day and voting was held in the auxiliary gym which was at the back of campus. Because of these challenges we relocated to The Brunswick Center at Shallotte. The Board of Education has been consistent in providing teacher workdays on election day, making West Brunswick High School a more suitable location. Voting will be held in the cafeteria which is at the front of campus.



## Precinct CB04 Secession 2 – change in polling location


The Holden Beach EOC is not ideal for voting due to its limited parking. We recommend relocating to Sabbath Home Baptist Church, 990 Sabbath Home Rd SW, Supply, NC 28462.

This polling place would be out of precinct. The church has requested that electioneering be restricted, and we would ask the state to approve the restriction.



## Precinct NB01 Hood Creek – change in polling location

Sandy Creek Town Hall is not ideal for voting due to space and parking limitations. We recommend relocating to Bethel AME Church, 4924 Blue Banks Loop Rd NE, Leland, NC 28451.



Precinct NB06 Brunswick Forest – adding additional equipment to facilitate election day turnout


The Brunswick Forest precinct experienced significant lines on election day during the primary. We have explored solutions to address these long lines and believe that adding additional equipment will prevent them in the general election.

Following the general election, an assessment will be conducted to determine if this precinct should be split and how best to do so.

## Precinct SB02 Boiling Spring Lakes – change in polling location

The current polling place is the Boiling Spring Lakes Community Center. We recommend moving to South Brunswick High School, 280 Cougar Rd, Southport, NC 28461. South Brunswick High School can accommodate higher voter turnout in this precinct.




### Precinct WB06 Grissettown – change in polling location

In 2021, this precinct was redrawn to accommodate the use of the new Ocean Isle Beach Town Hall. Since that time, there have been several instances of there not being sufficient parking available for voters. Despite arranging off-site parking for precinct officials, parking availability remains problematic.

We recommend relocating to Seaside United Methodist Church, 1300 Seaside Rd SW, Sunset Beach, NC 28468. This polling place would be out of precinct. Seaside UMC is a 9-minute drive from the current polling place of Ocean Isle Beach Town Hall.

The church has requested that electioneering be restricted, and we would ask the state to approve the restriction.

Brunswick Forest needs more resources for the 2024 Election

I am very concerned about the ability to have a secure election in Brunswick County. My definition of a secure election being that only citizens vote and vote only once. Your primary function as the Brunswick County Board of Elections is to assure that we have secure elections. CURRENT REALITY: Brunswick County Voter Rolls Issues – FULL DETAILS TO BE PROVIDED - Not HAVA compliant – 3,138 without a Driver's License or Social Security number - Questionable voter age – 1 @ 124 - Potential duplicate registrations – 150+ first and last names reversed, etc. -

Deceased voters currently DECEASED – and – CONFIRMED or VERIFIED – 4 Non-citizens are counted by the US Census because they count toward determining US Congressional representation. In the 2023 census data it was estimated that there were 22,000,000+ non-citizens in the US based on the 2020 census data. In the last 3 ½ years there have been over 10,000,000+ illegal aliens that have entered the US. Why? With all the benefits – housing, food, medical care, and money – being provided to illegal aliens it might be easy for them to believe they are a US citizen. Illegal aliens are being provided Voter Registration forms that are printed in 22 different languages. North Carolina prints Voter Registration forms in Spanish, and there are efforts underway to register Spanish speaking people. Laws have been passed that allow non-citizens to vote in our elections and that information has been shared all over the US by the mainstream media. This promotes the idea that non-citizens can vote. Citizens born and raised in the US have a 99% chance of being able to speak and read basic English, and naturalized citizens are required by that process to be able to speak and read basic English. There is a 99% chance that legal voters can speak and read basic English, while non-legal voters cannot. The SAVE Act in Congress that would require that only US citizens can vote in Federal Elections passed the House of Representatives, but the Senate has refused to bring it up for a vote. Why? The North Carolina Constitutional Amendment requiring that only US citizens vote that will be on the ballot only affects 2025 and beyond, not 2024. No bills were passed to address 2024. Why? By US Title 18: non-citizens can vote without penalty if at the time they are voting, they believe themselves to be U.S. citizens. Why not vote with no penalty? SUMMARY: There are many aspects of the voter registration process and execution of the election that are not supportive of having a secure election. You as a Board Member cannot control what the Federal government or the NCSBE does that may negatively impact your ability to provide secure elections in Brunswick County. However, you have the responsibility to assure that Brunswick County has the most secure 2024 election possible. What I am asking you to do: - Assure that we have accurate and up to date voter rolls. DETAILS TO BE PROVIDED. - Provide public information that only US citizens can vote. - Provide Polling Place signage in English and Spanish at ALL Polling Places: If you are NOT a citizen of the United States of America it is ILLEGAL for you to vote. SAMPLE TO BE PROVIDED. Thank you for doing everything you can to assure a secure election in Brunswick County! Gary Ostby
