C. Quarterly Focus - Prevention

1. Preventing ACEs

2. Brunswick County DSS Data

- a. From Michelle Mills, Permanency Planning Coordinator
 - i. Typically, combination of substance abuse and other factors, like domestic violence or mental health
 - ii. Active Cases over last 6 months, at least 80% of cases have concerns for substance abuse of 1 or more parents (128/160).
 - iii. 2023, 70 cases closed out successfully, only 20 of those were reunifications. Other 50 were either adoption, guardianship/custody with a relative. Not high rate of reunification.
 - iv. In 2024 so far, closed out 42 kids, only 10 of those with their parents.
 - v. Looking into data for pregnant women using substances or substances affected infants that they have gotten reports on.
 - vi. Mental Health Clinician will be connecting cases with community resources for substance abuse for parents, youth – teens especially. Trying to start meeting with 18-21 years old with LINKS staff member and kinship providers support groups to assist with life skills training and education on coping/support during this time.
- b. Struggling to find placement within county for foster children, large deficit in options. Decrease in therapeutic foster parents being patient/tolerant of foster children with behavioral issues. Torbich asked if Seahaven in South Carolina would be a good model – look into that. Trillium coverage is also hard to find for placement facilities, and placement for dual diagnosis is difficult to find as well. Best guess

of need for foster homes is at least 50 as soon as possible that would be close to meeting a goal. Huge need for foster parents in Brunswick County due to high growth rate and challenges in successful placement. Commission could work to advocate for need of foster care homes and encourage an agency/group/etc. to work on filling need of group respite/foster care setting (long term). Opportunities for advocacy and community engagement. Large number of children in care who are recommended for trauma informed therapy but lack of qualified providers in the area who are able/capable of working with children to implement trauma informed therapy techniques. Trillium is working to get the state to approve payment to therapeutic foster care providers to get payment while being trained; also working to propose a temporary evaluation facility for children to go to determine appropriate placement and interventions that are needed. Trillium focuses on promoting and offering preventative and in home services instead of group home settings to improve outcomes. Data/statistics on socioeconomic backgrounds and rates/initiation of substance use by youth and trends of this data. Prevention for children at risk, secondary prevention for adults to prevent the children being in a risky environment. Commission is interested in Seahaven staff members coming to share some of their information, data, outcomes, treatment modalities. There is a need for Court Appointed Special Advocates in Brunswick County that people can volunteer and get trained to do to make some sort of difference. Laura will be attending the August 15th JCPC meeting to speak about what the SUAMH Commission is doing and to understand/learn more about what the JCPC is working on.

Notes: Presentation given by Olivia Jarvis, Health Educator. Discussion followed of what could be taken away from the information shared. Discussion of struggles of Brunswick County residents and families specifically. Financial resources and access are challenges. No resources or follow-up after completion of drug treatment court other than NA/AA/CR meetings. Big adjustment from the consequences in the program to no consequences at all after completion. Highlighted need of sober community support and establishment.

i. VOA Chesapeake & Carolinas Report: "Good day to everyone again. Just as an FYI, Volunteers of America Chesapeake and Carolinas has been awarded a SAMHSA SUD Prevention Grant, affectionally named, the Quad County SAVE Program. We will be serving Bladen, Pender, Columbus, and Brunswick Counties. This program is set to launch

10/1/2024. Initially one of our initiatives will be to develop a QUAD County Coalition with providers, partners, people with lived experience, and various walks of life. Over the next 90 days, we would be honored to share this program with this group as well as to partner with all of you in serving North Carolinians in this area. We will be releasing a few new job opportunities to gain individuals from the area to develop the team in this area. Dani (BCHS Intern) inquiring about school prevention strategies and programs, Brooke (BCHS Intern) researching evidence based, recommended programs from NIDA/SAMHSA/CDC/etc. This will establish a baseline for prevention strategies in youth. Ask Jennifer Faircloth who she would recommend speaking to the commission regarding school-based prevention. Olivia will reach out and schedule. Baseline information from youth could include where they see themselves or peers exposed to or acquiring drugs, what makes them decide to begin using these substances, what are their viewpoints? Identification of where to intervene – where youth are beginning and how to combat this beginning point. Laura asked Jeremy Seamon to put together a summary of the levels of

treatment availability for youth for the upcoming BOC report. ACEs presentation provide generic strategies for addressing prevention as a framework, highlight what already exists and how/what in the county already vs what is still missing to inform recommendations. Cecelia to work on gathering on what Trillium has to offer for these specific services. Director of Operations at CRCI from Seahaven could also provide some insight, input from Dwane to work on with Josh following meeting. Mr. Howard inquired about possibility of pulling local ACEs data from providers and how feasible that could be. Discussion of data focused vs solution focused presentation and how to incorporate solutions into the outline of quarterly update format using the preventing aces presentation framework. Perhaps a recommendation to BOC of aces screening necessity. Duke data set did pick out some statistics of ACEs.

**Enhanced Services Available to Children through Trillium
Health Resources**

- **Intensive In Home:** Intensive In-Home (IIH) is a home based, family focused Mental Health service led by a Licensed Mental Professional and Qualified Mental Professionals. IIH is designed to address the identified needs of children and adolescents who, due to serious and chronic symptoms of an emotional, behavioral, or substance use disorder, are unable to remain stable in the community without intensive interventions
 - **Providers:** Coastal Horizons, Coastal Southeastern United Care

- **Multi-Systemic Therapy:** Multisystemic Therapy (MST) is a nationally recognized evidence-based, intensive family and community-based program that addresses multiple aspects of serious behavior problems and Substance Use in adolescents. Youth served by MST are at risk of out-of-home placement due to delinquency, adjudicated youth returning from out-of-home placement, chronic or violent, and youth with serious emotional disturbances or a substance use disorder.
 - **Providers:** Alexander Youth Network

- **High Fidelity Wraparound:** High Fidelity Wraparound is an evidence-based model of support to help youth continue living at home, attending school or work and remaining stable. The process helps families learn how to meet their needs and use their support systems to handle their challenges and struggles.
 - **Provider:** Pride In NC

- **Child First:** Child First is an evidenced based mental health program which helps struggling families build strong, nurturing relationships that heal and protect young children from the impact of trauma and chronic stress. Child First focuses on children age 0-5 and their families.
 - **Provider:** Coastal Horizons

- **Family Centered Treatment:** Family Centered Treatment (FCT) is an evidence based and well-supported trauma treatment model of home-based family therapy. FCT is one of few home based treatment models that has extensive experience with families and youth who move between the child welfare, mental health, and juvenile justice systems, otherwise known as “crossover youth.”
 - **Provider:** Coastal Horizons

Feedback from Trillium Youth Care Managers

The Trillium Youth Care Managers see a need for the following:

- More local residential providers at higher levels of care.
- A mentoring program for at-risk youth (not only those who are already involved with DJJ).
- A safety initiative for substance use/misuse for youth who partake in vaping (with new THC/CBD/Fentanyl contaminants).
- Naloxone disbursement and education.

Evidence-Based Youth Prevention Programs

Family Skill Building Program

- Parents or Guardians & Children ages 9-17
- Provided by Coastal Horizons
- Works on family communication and relationship building.

Life Skills

- 3rd – 4th Grade
 - Material covers topics like self-esteem, decision-making, smoking information, advertising, dealing with stress, communication skills, social skills, and building assertiveness.
- 6th – 9th Grade
 - Material focuses on decision-making while building on content covered in the 3rd – 4th grade course.
- 9th – 10th Grade
 - Material covers the value of good health, decision-making for health, risk-taking and substance abuse, the media and health, managing stress, anger and other emotions, family communications, and healthy relationships.

Cannabis/Marijuana Awareness and Prevention Toolkit

- Middle & High School
- Compiled by SAMHSA
- Theory-based and Evidence-informed
- Focuses solely on marijuana

Project Alert

- Middle School
- Created by SAMHSA
- Material focuses on reducing substance use, fostering anti-drug attitudes and beliefs, and improving drug-resistance skills.

Health Rocks

- Ages 12 – 14
- Utilized by 4-H programs
- Covers tobacco, alcohol, and other drugs

Over-the-Counter Medication Safety

- 5th – 6th Grade & 7th – 8th Grade
- Created by the OTC Medicine Safety Coalition
- Covers OTC medication safety & safety practices

NIAAA for Middle School

- Gives students a clearer picture about alcohol use among their peers along with skills to resist pressure to drink and developing reasons not to drink.

Levels of Care in Brunswick County that are Available for Adolescents & Teens with Substance Use Disorder Concerns

(Based on ASAM Levels of Care)

Level 0.5, which is called Early Intervention. Early intervention can consist of assessment and education for people at risk of developing a substance use disorder, or programs like DUI classes for people arrested for driving under the influence. The goal of .5 services is to intervene before a person develops a substance use disorder.

- *Prevention Services through Brunswick County Schools*
- *Prevention efforts of CRCI going into schools during October/anti vaping*
- *Anti-Smoking Initiatives*
- *Coastal Horizons Prevention Services:*
 - *Guiding Good Choices Target Population: parents/caregivers of youth ages 9-14*
 - *Systematic Training for Effective Parenting Target Population: parents/caregivers of youth ages 12-17*
 - *CATCH My Breath - Provides evidence-based youth nicotine vaping programs for school-aged youth and provides resources for parents.*
 - *Unique You - Provides an evidence-based substance abuse prevention curriculum to 3rd & 4th graders to learn to resist drugs and give a clear "no use" message.*
 - *Awareness Campaigns - National Drug Facts Week, National Prevention Week, Red Ribbon Week, Drugs Uncovered, Community Engagement*

Level 1, [outpatient treatment](#) consists of treatment for substance use that is less than 9 hours a week. Level 1 is appropriate for people with less severe disorders, or as a step-down from more intensive services.

- *Outpatient Counseling is available for clients who have insurance through multiple counseling outlets who take third party insurance and Medicaid. Client families who are uninsured can apply for Medicaid or can apply for State Funded Counseling through a Counseling Agency that is contracted with Trillium Health Resources.*

Level 2.1 is [intensive outpatient services](#) consisting of at least 9 and no more than 20 hours per week of treatment. These programs typically offer medical care 24 hours a day by phone or within 72 hours in person.

- *This level of care is not available in or near Brunswick County NC currently. However, in the past 15 years the most common referral for clients who meet this level of care is to an enhanced community-based family service such as Intensive In Home Services or Family Centered Treatment. The goal of this intervention is to work with the client and family to discontinue drug use to prevent out of home placement that might be needed, specifically residential drug treatment. Additionally, Multi Systemic Therapy is available locally through Alexander Youth Network and might be considered for an adolescent with SUD as a primary concern.*

Level 2.5 is partial hospitalization, which is at least 20 hours a week but is less than 24-hour care. This level of care provides structure, and daily oversight for people who need daily monitoring, but not 24/7 care.

- *This level of care is currently not available for adolescents in Southeastern NC.*

Level 3.1 is clinically managed low-intensity residential treatment. [Residential services](#) at this level consist of a setting, such as a group home, where people live. However, treatment is only required to be 5 hours per week, which helps people with such topics as relapse management.

- *This level of care is not available in Southeastern NC. However, there is one that is available to Trillium Members located in Greenville, NC that is run by Port Health.*

Level 3.3 is clinically managed high-intensity and population-specific services. These programs are targeted for providing treatment designed to move at a slower pace, for people with cognitive functioning issues, including people with traumatic brain injuries, or people with developmental disabilities.

- *This level of care is not available for adolescents with a primary SUD in Eastern NC.*

Level 3.5 is clinically managed residential services. These services are designed for people with serious psychological or social issues who need 24-hour oversight and are at risk of imminent harm.

- *This level of care includes medically monitored detox. Currently there are several medically monitored detox facilities in Eastern NC designed for adults but not for the adolescent population.*

Level 3.7 is medically managed high intensity [inpatient treatment](#). These services are for people who need intensive medical or psychological monitoring in a 24-hour setting but do not need daily physician interaction.

- *This level of care would include a patient who was engaged in a longer-term inpatient stay with a monitored recovery plan which might include medications or detoxification. An example of this locally would be Wilmington Treatment Center or Lighthouse Behavioral Health Hospital in Conway SC which offers a somewhat traditional “28 day” inpatient program. It is my understanding that WTC will take a patient as young as 17 and Lighthouse will accept adolescents also for acute care for withdrawal or stabilization.*

Level 4 provides 24-hour nursing care and daily physician visits.

- *People in this level of care need daily physician monitoring, along with 24-hour oversight. This level of care is an acute hospital stay which could represent time in a local emergency room or inpatient stay or could include an adolescent who has been committed into an inpatient facility in NC for round the clock acute observation, detoxification, withdrawal, and stabilization due to severe acuity.*

Prevention Feedback from Judge Hankins

Prevention Needs in Brunswick County Regarding Youth & DJJ:

- A substance use disorder clinician who can provide in-person therapy to juveniles in Brunswick County.
- Clinician available to provide onsite assessments for juveniles that have entered the criminal justice system.
- Family education programs that can engage families and teach them about substance use.

Prevention Strategies Available for use in Brunswick County:

- Juvenile courses offered online through the court system for criminal charges include
 - THC 101
 - Under the Influence
- ALE Operations that remove illegal products off of the market.
